Greater Depth Identify a passive sentence within a passage. Includes multi-clause sentences or sentences with an expanded noun phrase where the object is always omitted.

Expected Rearrange words to create a sentence written in the passive form. Includes sentences containing an expanded noun phrase or single clause sentences where the object is sometimes omitted.

Greater Depth Rearrange words to create a sentence written in the passive form. Includes multiclause sentences or sentences with an expanded noun phrase where the object is always omitted.


