### Feel the power

Witness the earliest experiments that revealed how electricity could be harnessed in a show rooted in the Ri's history of discoveries relating to magnetism and electricity. This show tells the story of electricity with live demonstrations, audience interaction and content ranging from explanations of static electricity to modern day use of generators.

There are 3 shows:

- 10.50 – 11.50 School Show 1 for Years 1 -3
- 2.00 – 3.00 School Show 2 for Years 4 - 6
- 6pm – 7pm Community Show – tickets available to purchase: Adults £3 Children £1

We have about 60 spaces available at each school show if you are interested in bringing any of your classes. I have included all our local schools in this invite and the spaces will be shared with the first contacts. We are asking our children for a contribution to help us fund the event and we would be grateful for any donations you are able to make to help cover our costs.
