Cherry  Key Texts  	<p>Once upon a time, Little Red set off into the woods to catch a wolf . . . But the woods aren't all they seem and are there even any wolves left? Mini Grey re-imagines the classic Little Red Riding Hood fable in an entirely new way. Can Little Red help her new friends in need and recover the wild days of the past?</p> <p>This is a powerful, moving and funny picture book which will have children and adults revisiting its exquisite pages time and time again, and discussing the important message it holds.</p>	<p><i>Inspired by Flat Stanley</i>, this text supports inclusion by showing that difference does not reduce a person's value or belonging. When Stanley's body changes, those around him adapt so he can continue to participate fully in family, school, and community life. The story highlights how diversity can be a strength and promotes empathy, respect, and creative inclusion, key principles of equality and inclusive practice.</p> 	<p>A witty twist on a favourite fairy tale, this bold and funny story removes the handsome prince altogether, making Rapunzel the mistress of her own destiny.</p> <p>Golden-haired princess Rapunzel is kept trapped in her lofty tower by a wicked witch, who lops off locks of her beautiful hair and sells them for her own profit. Can Rapunzel ever figure out a way to escape?</p> 	<p>Oliver's Vegetables supports equality, diversity and inclusion by recognising that children have individual preferences and responses, particularly around food. The text promotes respectful, non-judgmental encouragement rather than pressure, helping children feel safe to explore new experiences. This approach reinforces wellbeing, autonomy, and a sense of belonging for all learners.</p>	<p><i>The Magic Finger</i> helps children think about fairness and how our actions affect others. The story encourages empathy and kindness by showing why everyone deserves to be treated with respect and listened to. It supports children's understanding that we all have rights and responsibilities in how we behave towards people and living things.</p>	<p>Prince Cinders leads a very hard life. Bullied by his three hairy brothers about his less-than-perfect looks, he spends all his time cleaning and tidying up after them. One Saturday night Prince Cinders' luck changes as a small, dirty fairy falls down the chimney and promises that his wishes shall come true. Not all the fairy's spells turn out as planned in this zany twist of a traditional story.</p>

Key Texts	<p><i>Leon and the Place Between</i> celebrates inclusion by showing how curiosity, courage, and imagination can bring people together. The story highlights empathy, collaboration, and respect for others, encouraging children to appreciate different perspectives. It supports a sense of belonging by showing that everyone can take part and contribute in meaningful ways.</p>	<p>In this re-telling of the classic children's story by author of <i>The Snowman</i> Raymond Briggs, a little boy called Jim finds a beanstalk outside his window one morning. Like his predecessor Jack, he decides to climb it - and at the top, he finds a huge castle and a rather grumpy giant. But this giant isn't at all what Jim expected . . .</p> <p>This funny and yet heart-warming story showcases the importance of friendship, problem-solving, and above all - kindness.</p>	<p><i>The Egyptian Cinderella</i> promotes inclusion by highlighting fairness, kindness, and recognition of everyone's abilities, regardless of their social status. The story shows how the main character, Rhodopis, overcomes exclusion and prejudice through courage, resilience, and the support of others. It encourages respect for diversity, the value of helping others, and the importance of treating everyone with dignity.</p>	<p><i>Into the Forest</i> supports inclusion by exploring fear, vulnerability, and empathy through a child's journey into the unknown. The story reflects how children experience emotions differently and shows the importance of courage, understanding, and connection. It encourages respect for others' feelings and recognises that everyone needs support when facing challenges.</p>	<p><i>The Rhythm of the Rain</i> highlights the connections between people, places, and the natural world. It follows the global journey of water, from a boy's mountain pool, down rivers, through countryside and city, to the vast ocean, and then as rain falling on people and places far away. The story encourages respect for diverse experiences and cultures while exploring the shared impact of nature on everyone. It supports inclusion by promoting global awareness, empathy, and understanding of the interdependence of people and places.</p>	<p>The <i>Tinderbox</i> shows how courage, cleverness, and making fair choices can help everyone.
